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INTRODUCTION

The Alaska Workers' Compensation Appeals Commission (Commission) is charged with providing fair, prompt, and thoughtful adjudication of appeals from decisions by the Alaska Workers' Compensation Board (Board). An appeal the Commission is а formal administrative appeal and appeal decisions must be published. The Commission is committed to ensuring that "hearings in workers' compensation cases shall be impartial and fair to all parties and that all parties shall be afforded due process and an opportunity to be heard and for their arguments and evidence to be fairly considered." AS 23.30.001(4).

Figure 1 in the next column illustrates the place of the Commission in the workers' compensation adjudication system.

The Commission chair has certain duties prescribed by law. One of the chair's duties is to make available to the public, and to file with the office of the lieutenant governor, a report regarding the Commission's activity for the prior calendar year, including data regarding time periods between initial receipt and final decisions on appeals, not later than March 15th of each year. This report is filed to satisfy that duty.

Under workers' compensation law, the **Alaska Supreme Court** (supreme court) hears appeals from decisions by the Commission. The supreme court decides all questions of law, including constitutionality of statutes and the validity and constitutionality of regulations.

The Alaska Workers' Compensation **Appeals** Commission hears appeals from decisions by the Board. There are five appeals commissioners: two appeals commissioners are employee representatives and two are employer representatives. The chair is an attorney. An appeal must be heard by one employee commissioner, one employer commissioner, and the chair. Commission decisions bind the Commission itself and all Board panels to a uniform interpretation of workers' compensation law. The Commission must follow supreme court rulings. Appeals are decided on the Board's record and arguments presented by the parties. Commissioners use independent judgment on law and procedure, but do not reweigh facts. Commission is in the Department of Labor and Workforce Development, but is independent of the Division of Workers' Compensation.

The Division of Workers' Compensation (Division) has offices in Anchorage, Fairbanks, and Juneau, where parties can obtain information, file a claim or petition with the Board, and attend Board hearings. The Division also collects data. enforces reporting, reviews self-insurance certificates, and also manages the Workers' Compensation Benefits Guaranty Fund, the Fishermen's Fund, and the Second Injury Fund. The Division provides needed administrative support to the Board. Division sections. and the Commission.

The Adjudications Section's hearing officers, pre-hearing officers, and clerks assist the Board to hear, mediate, and decide cases.

The Special Investigations Unit investigates and prosecutes fraud and uninsured employers before the Board.

The *Director* may intervene in appeals.

The **Alaska** Workers' Compensation **Board** hears claims and petitions injured workers, employers, and Division investigators. The Board panels conduct hearings of many kinds and approve settlements. The Board consists of nine industry members, nine labor members, and the Commissioner of the Department of Labor, who is the chair. Board members are appointed to three-year terms. The Board hears cases in three-member panels (one labor member, one industry member, and one hearing officer), but may hear a case with a quorum of two representative member and a hearing officer). Each Board panel is independent, but must follow Commission and supreme court rulings. The Board as a whole body approves regulations adopted by the Division.

COMMISSION MEMBERS

The Commission consists of five members: four representative members and the chair. Each representative member must have at least 18 months of experience as a member of the Board. Two members represent employees and two represent employers. The chair must be an attorney who has been engaged in the active practice of law for at least five years in Alaska with experience in workers' compensation law in this state.

The Chief Administrative Law Judge in the Office of Administrative Hearings announces and reviews the applications for each vacancy on the Commission and forwards a list of qualified nominees to the Governor for appointment. The Alaska State Legislature must confirm appointees.

The commissioners' five-year terms are staggered so a seat on the Commission falls vacant every year. Because every appeal is heard by a full, balanced panel, and panelists may not hear cases if they have a connection with a party, avoiding vacancies is a concern of the Commission.

The members of the Commission are:

Laurence P. Keyes has served as chair since March 1, 2010, and his term will expire on March 1, 2015. Mr. Keyes has practiced law in Kodiak and Anchorage since 1982. Since 1990, he has specialized in litigation of bodily injury and property damage claims, including workers' compensation claims. He also served as an arbitrator of personal injury claims and as an adjunct professor at the University of Alaska Anchorage Justice Center, lecturing in

Maritime and Fisheries Law. He received his LL.M. in maritime law from the University of London in 1988, his J.D. *magna cum laude* from Gonzaga University in 1981, and his B.A. in philosophy from the University of Wisconsin-Madison in 1970.

Andrew М. Hemenway appointed chair of the commission Walker bv Governor Bill on February 3, 2015, and will take office after Mr. Keyes' term expires. His appointment is subject to legislative confirmation. Mr. Hemenway is an administrative law judge in the Office of Administrative Hearings. In that capacity conducts hearings and issues decisions for a variety of administrative agencies. He has experience in workers' compensation law as a staff attorney for the Alaska Supreme Court and in private practice, and has served as the pro tempore chair of the commission. received his LL.M. in law and maritime affairs from the University of Washington 1986, his J.D. from the University of Houston in 1976, and his B.A. in philosophy from Amherst College in 1970.

James N. Rhodes, an employee representative, of Ketchikan, is a 20-year member of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers Union Local 1547. He served as a member for labor on the Board from August 2001 until March 2005. He was appointed by Governor Sean Parnell to complete a four-year term as commissioner in 2012. His term expires on March 1, 2016.

S. T. Hagedorn, an employer representative, of Anchorage, retired from the Alaska Railroad Corporation in June 2009 after a 34-year career, with

the last 24 years as Corporate Risk Manager. He was appointed as a member for industry to the Board in by Governor Walter 1991 Hickel, reappointed twice by Governor Tony Knowles, and reappointed in 2006 by Governor Frank Murkowski (15 years of Board service). He has a B.A. in history from the University of Northern Iowa. He was appointed by Governor Sarah Palin to a five-year term as commissioner in March 2007, and reappointed by Governor Sean Parnell to another fiveyear term in February 2012. His term expires on March 1, 2017.

David W. Richards, an employee representative, of Eagle River, is a retired member of Carpenters' Union Local 2247 and a retired member of Laborers' Local 341. He served as a member for labor for 15 years on the Board in Juneau until 1991. He was appointed by Governor Sarah Palin to a five-year term as commissioner in March 2008 and reappointed by Governor Sean Parnell to a five-year term in February 2013. Commissioner Richards' term was to end on March 1, 2018; however, he resigned his position effective February 15, 2015. Commission is currently awaiting the appointment of a new employee commissioner.


Philip E. Ulmer, employer an representative, of Eagle River, is a Certified Workers' Compensation Professional, currently employed Sr. Manager of Safety and Workers' Compensation for GCI. He is a previous national president of the American Society of Safety Engineers and of the National Institute for Engineering Ethics, and a 1994 Engineer of the Year finalist with the Alaska Society of Professional Engineers. He served as a member for industry on the Board. He was appointed by Governor Frank Murkowski to a four-year term as commissioner in November 2005, reappointed by Governor Sarah Palin to a five-year term in March 2009, and reappointed by Governor Sean Parnell to a five-year term in March 2014. **His term expires on March 1, 2019**.

COMMISSION CASES

Cases Filed in 2014


The Commission docketed 30 new cases in calendar year (CY) 2014, an increase of 15% from CY 2013. Figure 2 shows the types of cases filed in 2014.

There is seasonal variation in the filing of appeals and petitions for review, as shown in Figure 3.

In addition to the 30 new cases docketed in 2014, the Commission began 2014 with 15 cases on its docket: one filed in CY 2010, and 14 filed in CY 2013.

At the end of 2014, the Commission had 22 cases on its docket: one case filed in CY 2011 which was remanded to the Commission by the supreme court in December, 2014; three cases filed late in CY 2013 in which oral arguments were heard in early CY 2015, and 19 cases filed in 2014.

Figure 4 shows the number of open cases on the Commission docket at the end of each month, the number of new cases filed each month, and other types of production in 2014.

Appendix A is the Commission's complete 2014 docket, which also includes cases from prior years that were appealed or petitioned for review to the supreme court, and contains notes on the status of those cases. Appendix A also contains cases from prior years that were remanded from the supreme court to the Commission further action.

Oral Arguments, Hearings, and Orders

The Commission held a total of 13 hearings in 2014 – 11 oral arguments on appeal and two hearings on motions for stays. Some appeal participants did not request oral argument; those appeals were decided on briefs.

The Commission issued orders on motions regarding such issues as extensions of time to file appeals, stays pending appeal, dismissals, waivers of filing fees and/or transcription costs due to indigence, attorney fees, clarification, reconsideration, suspension of appeal proceedings, and orders granting or denying petitions for review. The Commission chair issued orders on motions for extensions of time to file briefs, notices of default with orders to comply, and similar procedural matters. In 2014, the Commission issued 117 unpublished orders, a 24% increase from CY 2013.

<u>Average Time Period for Cases</u> <u>Closed in 2014</u>

In addition to the 15 cases that were on the docket at the beginning of 2014 and the 30 new cases that were filed in 2014, six cases were reopened on the 2014 docket due to supreme court appeals that were remanded to the Commission for further proceedings: one from CY 2009, three from CY 2011, one from CY 2012, and one from CY 2013. Also, one CY 2013 case that was decided at the end of CY 2013 came back on the CY 2014 docket due to a motion for reconsideration that was filed and deemed denied early in CY 2014. Taken together, a total of 52 cases appeared on the 2014 Commission docket (Appendix A), a 16% increase over CY 2013.

Of the 52 cases that appeared on the 2014 docket, 30 cases were closed in 2014. This resulted in a closure rate of 58% of the total number of cases that appeared on the 2014 docket. The average time period from the date of

filing to the date of closure for those 30 cases was 162 days.

Of the 30 cases filed in 2014, 12 were also closed in 2014, resulting in a closure rate of 40% for cases filed and closed in 2014. The average time period from the date of filing to the date of closure for cases that were filed and closed in 2014 was 89 days.

Resolution of Cases in 2014

Thirty of the 52 cases that were on the 2014 docket were closed in 2014: 12 resulted in decisions on the merits of the appeals; five resulted in orders on remand after being remanded to the Commission by the supreme court; five cases were settled; five petitions for review were denied; one motion for reconsideration was denied; one was voluntarily dismissed; and one resulted in dismissal for failure to prosecute. Indigent Participants

In 2014, the Commission granted two of seven motions to waive payment of a filing fee due to indigence. There were 11 motions for waiver of payment of transcript costs due to indigence: seven were granted and two were partially granted. In 2014, the Commission paid a total of \$6,107.50 to have Board hearings transcribed for indigent employees.


Attorney Representation

Unrepresented employees filed 10 of the thirty new cases in 2014. In the cases filed by unrepresented employees, all the opposing parties were represented by an attorney. Seven cases were filed by represented employees with all of the opposing parties being represented, except in one case with a non-participating employer.

Employers filed 12 cases, with two of those filed by unrepresented employers. In all but one of those 12 cases, all of the opposing parties were represented; one had an unrepresented employee. One case was filed by the Workers' Compensation Benefits Guaranty Fund, which was represented, the employer was represented, and the unrepresented employee did not participate.

Figure 5 compares unrepresented participants to represented participants. When compared to CY 2013, the number of cases filed by unrepresented employees increased by three, cases filed by represented employees increased by one, cases filed by represented employers remained the same, and cases filed by unrepresented employers also remained the same.

COMMISSION DECISIONS

Published Decisions

In 2014, 15 Commission decisions were published. Twelve were on the of merits an appeal, two were memorandum decisions regarding motions for stays, and one was a memorandum decision regarding а

motion for attorney fees. Appendix B is a list of the Commission's 2014 published decisions, with notes on the number of days from oral argument or record closure to a final decision on the merits of the appeal, and whether the Commission's decision was appealed or petitioned for review to the supreme court.

The average time from oral argument (or record closure if oral argument was not requested) to the issuance of a final decision on the merits of an appeal in 2014 was 20 days, well within the statutory allowance of 90 days.

<u>Time Period between Initial</u> <u>Receipt and Decision on Appeal</u>

As shown in Appendix B, the average time period between the initial receipt of an appeal and the issuance of a final decision on the merits of the appeal for cases on the 2014 docket was 321 days. This is an average of six more days than in CY 2013.

<u>Published Decisions – Case</u> Resolution

The results of Commission decisions published in 2014 are summarized in Appendix B. Of the 12 final decisions issued on the merits of appeals of Board decisions: five affirmed the Board's decision; one affirmed in part and remanded to the Board; one affirmed in part, reversed in part, and remanded to the Board; two affirmed in part, vacated in part, and remanded to the Board; one reversed the Board's decision; one Board decision was remanded; and one was affirmed in part, reversed in part, vacated in part, and remanded to the Board.

The Commission issued no decisions regarding petitions for review of interlocutory Board decisions in 2014, as no petitions for review were granted in 2014. The Commission does not consider the granting or denial of a petition for review to be a decision on the merits of the challenged Board decision.

SUPREME COURT ACTION

In 2014, seven Commission decisions or orders were appealed to the supreme court; all are currently awaiting supreme court rulings.

Four Commission decisions or orders were petitioned for review to the supreme court; two were denied and two were dismissed, leaving no petitions for review awaiting decisions.

A total of nine Commission decisions or orders presently await a supreme court ruling: one issued in CY 2011; one issued in CY 2013; and, seven issued in 2014. See Appendix A to see which decisions or orders await supreme court rulings.

In 2014, the supreme court decided six appeals of Commission decisions.

The supreme court issued an opinion in 2014 on an appeal filed in CY 2011, *Coppe vs. Bleicher*, 318 P.3d 369, which affirmed the Commission's decision, which affirmed the Board's decision.

The supreme court issued an opinion in 2014 on an appeal filed in CY 2009, Harris v. M-K Rivers, 325 P.3d 510, affirmed which the Commission's reversed the decision in part, Commission's decision in part, and remanded to the Commission with instructions to remand to the Board, and vacated the Commission's decision in part, reinstating the Board's decision in part and remanding to the Commission.

The supreme court issued an opinion in 2014 on an appeal filed in CY 2012, Louie v. BP Exploration (Alaska), Inc., 327 P.3d 204, which affirmed the Commission's decision, which affirmed the Board's decision.

The supreme court issued an opinion in 2014 on an appeal filed in CY 2013, *Harris v. Millennium Hotel*, 330 P.3d 330, which vacated the Commission's decision and remanded to the Commission for further proceedings.

The supreme court also issued an opinion in 2014 on an appeal filed in CY 2011, Adamson v. Municipality of Anchorage, 333 P.3d 5, which affirmed the Commission's decision in part, reversed the Commission's decision in part, and remanded to the Commission with instructions to reinstate the Board's decision.

The supreme court issued an opinion in 2014 on another CY 2011 appeal, *Humphrey v. Lowe's Home Improvement Warehouse, Inc.*, 337 P.3d 1174, affirming the Commission's decision in part, but reversing the Commission's order on attorney fees and remanding that issue to the Commission for further proceedings.

The supreme court also issued an opinion in 2014 on a CY 2013 petition for review, *State of Alaska, Division of Workers' Compensation v. Titan Enterprises, LLC,* 338 P.3d 316, reversing and remanding the Commission's Order on Motion for Attorney Fees.

REGULATION CHANGES

No changes were made to the Commission's regulations during 2014.
