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Alaska Workers' Compensation Appeals Commission Annual Report for Calendar Year 2019

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INTRODUCTION

The Alaska Workers' Compensation Appeals Commission (Commission) is charged with providing fair, prompt, and thoughtful adjudication of appeals from decisions issued by the Alaska Workers' Compensation Board (Board). An appeal to the Commission is а formal administrative appeal and decisions must be published. The Commission is committed to ensuring that "hearings in workers' compensation cases shall be impartial and fair to all parties and that all parties shall be afforded due process and an opportunity to be heard and for their arguments and evidence to be fairly considered." AS 23.30.001(4).

Figure 1 in the next column illustrates the place of the Commission in the workers' compensation adjudication system.

The Commission Chair has certain duties prescribed by law. One of those duties is to make available to the public, and file with the lieutenant governor's office, a report of the Commission's activity for the prior calendar year, including data regarding time periods between initial receipt and final decisions on the merits of appeals, no later than March 15 of each year. This report is filed to satisfy that duty.

Under workers' compensation law, the **Alaska Supreme Court** hears appeals from Commission decisions. The Court decides all questions of law, including constitutionality of statutes and the validity and constitutionality of regulations.

The Alaska Workers' Compensation **Appeals** Commission hears appeals from Board decisions. There are five Commissioners: two who represent employees, two who represent employers, and the Chair, who is an attorney. An appeal must be heard by one employee Commissioner, one employer Commissioner, and the Chair. Commission decisions bind the Commission itself and all Board panels to a uniform interpretation of workers' compensation law. The Commission must follow Alaska Supreme Court rulings. Appeals are decided on the Board record and arguments presented by the parties. Commissioners use independent judgment on law and procedure, but do not reweigh facts. The Commission is in the Department of Labor and Workforce Development, but is independent of the Division of Workers' Compensation.

The **Alaska Workers' Compensation Board** hears claims and petitions by injured workers, employers, and Division investigators. The panels conduct hearings and approve settlements. The Board consists of nine industry members, nine labor members, and the Commissioner of the Department of Labor, who is the Chair. Board members are appointed to three-year terms. The Board hears cases in three-member panels (one labor member, one industry member, and one hearing officer), but may hear a case with a quorum of two (a representative member and a hearing officer). Each Board panel is independent, but must follow Commission and Alaska Supreme Court rulings. The Board approves regulations adopted by the Division.

Division of Workers' Compensation offices are located in Anchorage, Fairbanks, and Juneau. Division staff assist parties in obtaining information, filing claims and petitions, and requesting hearings. Division staff collect data, enforce reporting, review self-insurance certificates, and manage the Workers' Compensation Benefits Guaranty Fund, the Second Injury Fund, and the Fishermen's Fund. The Division also provides administrative support to Division sections, the Board, and the Commission.

The hearing officers, pre-hearing officers, and clerks of the *Adjudications Section* assist the Board to hear, mediate, and decide cases.

The Special Investigations Unit investigates and prosecutes fraud and uninsured employers before the Board.

The Division Director may intervene in appeals.

COMMISSION MEMBERS

The Commission consists of 5 members: 2 who represent employees, 2 who represent employers, and the Chair. Each representative member must have at least 18 months of experience as a Board member. The Chair must be an attorney who has engaged in the active practice of law for at least 5 years in Alaska with experience in workers' compensation law in this state.

The Chief Administrative Law Judge in the Office of Administrative Hearings announces vacancies and reviews the applications for each vacancy on the Commission, and forwards a list of qualified nominees to the Governor for appointment. The Alaska State Legislature must confirm appointees.

The Commissioners' 5-year terms are staggered so a seat on the Commission falls vacant every year. Because every appeal is heard by a full, balanced panel and a panelist may not hear a case if there is a conflict of interest, avoiding vacancies is a concern of the Commission.

The members of the Commission during 2019 were:

Deirdre D. Ford, Chair, of Anchorage, was appointed by Governor Bill Walker and took office on October 31, 2016, and reappointed by Governor Mike Dunleavy to a 5-year term in March 2020. Prior to her appointment, Ms. Ford was retired from the practice of law. From March 2009 to July 2012, Ms. Ford was a Hearing Officer with the Board in Anchorage. From June 1985 through February 2009, Ms. Ford practiced law with Delisio Moran Geraghty & Zobel with an emphasis in workers' compensation law, primarily representing employers. She received her J.D. cum laude from the University of San Francisco School of Law in 1984, her M.A. in Political Science from the University of Illinois Chicago in 1973, her M.L.S. in Library Science from the University of California Berkeley, and her B.A. in Political Science from Whittier College in 1963. **Her term expires on March 1, 2025.**

Philip E. Ulmer, an employer representative, an Eagle River resident for 35 years, is a Certified Workers' Compensation Professional. He is a previous national president of the American Society of Safety Engineers and of the National Institute for Engineering Ethics, and a 1994 Engineer of the Year finalist with the Alaska Society of Professional Engineers. He was appointed by Governor Frank Murkowski to a 4-year term in November 2005 when the Commission began, reappointed by Governor Sarah Palin to a 5-year term in March 2009, and reappointed bv Governor Sean Parnell to a 5-year term in March 2014. His last term expired on March 1, 2019, and the Commission members and staff wish him well in his future endeavors.

James N. Rhodes, an employee representative, of Ketchikan, is a 25year member of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers Local 1547. He served as a member for labor on the Board from August 2001 until March 2005. He was appointed by Governor Sean Parnell to a 4-year term in February 2012, and reappointed to a 5-year term by Governor Bill Walker in January 2016. **His term expires on March 1, 2021**.

S. T. Hagedorn, an employer representative, of Anchorage, retired from the Alaska Railroad Corporation in June 2009 after a 34-year career, with the last 24 years as Corporate Risk He was appointed as a Manager. member for industry to the Board in 1991 by Governor Walter Hickel, reappointed twice by Governor Tony Knowles, and reappointed in 2006 by Governor Frank Murkowski (15 years of Board service). He has a B.A. in history from the University of Northern Iowa. He was appointed by Governor Sarah Palin to a 5-year term as Commissioner in March 2007, reappointed by Governor Sean Parnell to another 5-year term in February 2012; and reappointed by Governor Bill Walker to an additional 5year term in February 2017. His term expires on March 1, 2022.

Michael J. Notar, an employee representative, of Juneau, was appointed in September 2015 bv Governor Bill Walker, and reappointed by Governor Bill Walker to a 5-year term in January 2018. After graduating high school in 1970 and a brief stint in college, he started his working career as a Surveyor with the State of Alaska in 1971. He also worked as a Teamster Surveyor before joining the International of Electrical Brotherhood Workers (IBEW) Local 1547 in 1977, where he worked as an Apprentice Electrician and Communications Technician. He was appointed in 1995 to the IBEW Local 1547 Assistant Business Manager position in Juneau, where he served for 15 years. He returned to State of Alaska service in 2010 at the Department of Labor and Workforce Development and served as a Wage and Hour Investigator, Special Assistant to the Commissioner,

Annual Report for Calendar Year 2019 Alaska Workers' Compensation Appeals Commission and Southeast Wage and Hour Supervising Investigator. He retired from active employment in 2013 and is a lifelong Alaskan. **His term expires on March 1, 2023.**

Amy М. Steele, an employer **representative**, of Anchorage, is the Senior Claims Coordinator at Chenega Corporation, where she has worked since 2009. Prior to her work with Chenega, she was a Senior Claims Examiner with Alaska National Insurance Company. Before moving to Alaska in 2002, she worked as a principal member of the risk management staff at Allegis Group, Inc. where she had worked since 1995. She graduated in 1995 from The New York State University at Oneonta with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Biology. She earned her Associate in Risk Management designation in 1999. She was appointed as a member for industry to the Board in 2011 by Governor Sean Parnell and reappointed by Governor Bill Walker until her term ended in March 2019. Ms. Steele was appointed to the Commission by Governor Mike Dunleavy in June 2019. Her term expires on March 1, 2024.


Andrew M. Hemenway, Chair pro tempore, of Juneau, was appointed by the Chief Administrative Law Judge in the Office of Administrative Hearings to hear several appeals due to potential conflicts of interest for the Chair. Prior to this, Mr. Hemenway served as Chair from March 2015 through April 2016 and as Chair pro tempore from May 2016 through October 2016. Prior to being appointed Chair in 2015, Mr. Hemenway was an Administrative Law Judge in the Office of Administrative Hearings. In that capacity he conducted hearings and issued decisions for a variety of administrative agencies. He had experience in workers' compensation law as a staff attorney for the Alaska Supreme Court and in private practice, and had previously served as a Chair *pro tempore* of the Commission. He received his LL.M. in law and maritime affairs from the University of Washington in 1986, his J.D. from the University of Houston in 1976, and his B.A. in philosophy from Amherst College in 1970.

COMMISSION CASES

New Cases Filed in 2019

The Commission docketed 22 new cases in 2019, 4 fewer than the number of new cases filed in 2018. Figure 2 shows the types of cases filed in 2019.

Appeals

Of the 22 new cases filed in 2019, 18 were appeals: 3 resulted in published final decisions on the merits of the appeal in 2019; 1 resulted in a published final decision on the merits of the appeal in early 2020; 1 was converted to a petition for review and denied in 2019; 3 settled in 2019; 2 settled in early 2020; 1 was dismissed in 2019; 1 is stayed pending further Board action; 1 2019 appeal was consolidated with a related 2018 appeal; and 5 are currently pending.

Petitions for Review

Of the 22 new cases filed in 2019, 4 were petitions for review: 1 was denied in 2019; 2 were denied in early 2020; and 1 was settled in 2019.

2019 Commission Docket

A total of 49 cases appeared on the Commission's 2019 docket, an increase of 1 case from 2018. *See* Figure 3.

In addition to the 22 new cases filed in 2019, the Commission began 2019 with 21 cases on its docket: 3 filed in 2017 and 18 filed in 2018.

The first 2017 case was still on the docket at the beginning of 2019 as it was filed in November 2017, several extensions of time were granted as the parties negotiated settlement, and one party filed for bankruptcy, which stayed the appeal proceeding.

The second 2017 case was still on the docket at the beginning of 2019 as it was filed in late December 2017 and several extensions of time were granted.

The third 2017 case came back on the docket in October 2018 due to an Alaska Supreme Court Memorandum Opinion and Judgment which necessitated further Commission proceedings.

At the end of 2019, the Commission had 15 cases on its docket. Two 2017 cases were on the docket due to remands from the Alaska Supreme Court in December 2019.

One 2018 case was still on the docket at the end of 2019 due to several granted extensions of time and a stay of appeal proceedings pending Board action on petitions filed by the appellant.

The remaining 12 cases were filed in 2019.

Figure 4 shows the number of open cases on the Commission docket at the end of each month during 2019, as well as the number of new cases filed, oral arguments and hearings held, published final decisions on the merits of appeals, published memorandum decisions, and unpublished orders issued during each month.

Appendix A is the Commission's complete 2019 docket. It contains for each case the date filed, type of case, attorney representation, Commission action, and any Alaska Supreme Court action.

Appendix A also includes cases from prior calendar years that are currently on appeal or petition for review before the Alaska Supreme Court, as well as cases from prior calendar years that were remanded to the Commission for further action in 2019.

Oral Arguments, Hearings, and Unpublished Orders

The Commission held 14 oral arguments and hearings in 2019, 4 more than were held in 2018. There were 8 oral arguments on the merits of appeals, 1 oral argument on a petition for review, and 5 hearings on motions for stay.

Oral argument was not requested in some appeals and those were decided on the record and written briefs. Figure 5 compares the number and types of hearings held by the Commission in 2019 with those held in 2018.

The Commission issued unpublished orders on motions for extensions of time to file appeals and petitions for review, stays of Board orders, dismissals, waivers of filing fees and/or transcript costs, attorney fees, reconsideration, stays of appeals, clarification, and granting or denying petitions for review. The Chair issued orders on procedural matters such as motions for extensions of time and notices of default and orders to comply. In 2019, a total of 136 unpublished orders were issued, an increase of 33 unpublished orders from 2018.

Average Time Period for Cases Closed in 2019

All Cases Closed in 2019

Of the 49 cases that appeared on the Commission's 2019 docket, 34 were closed in 2019. This is a closure rate of 69% of the total number of cases that appeared on the 2019 docket, an increase of 13% from the closure rate in 2018. *See* Figure 6.

The average time period from date of filing to date of closure for those 34 cases was 224 days, a decrease of 6 days from the 2018 average, and well under the Commission's target of processing cases within 360 days. *See* Figure 7.

All Cases Filed and Closed in 2019

Nine of the 22 cases filed in 2019 were also closed in 2019, a closure rate of 41% for cases both filed and closed in 2019. This is an increase of 10% from the 2018 closure rate for cases filed and closed in the same year. *See* Figure 8.

The average time period from date of filing to date of closure for the cases that were both filed and closed in 2019 was 134 days, an increase of 49 days from 2018. Again, this is well under the Commission's target of processing cases within 360 days. *See* Figure 9.

Resolution of Cases in 2019

Of the 34 cases on the 2019 docket that were closed, 17 resulted in decisions on the merits of appeals; 3 resulted in orders after Alaska Supreme Court Opinions; 7 settled; 3 petitions for review were denied; 1 petition for review resulted in a memorandum decision; and 3 cases were dismissed. *See* Appendix A.

Indigent Participants

In 2019, 3 unrepresented employees filed motions to waive payment of both the filing fee and transcript cost: 2 were granted in full and 1 was partially granted. Two waivers of payment of the filing fee were granted, for a total of \$100.00. All 3 waivers of payment of transcript cost were granted; however, 1 case settled prior to the transcript being ordered. In 2019, the Commission paid a total of \$990.00 to have Board hearing recordings transcribed on behalf of 2 indigent unrepresented parties.

Attorney Representation

Employees

Employees filed 15 of the 22 new cases in 2019, with 6 of those filed by unrepresented employees. In all cases filed by employees, all opposing parties were represented.

Figure 10 compares unrepresented and represented employees. Compared with 2018, the number of cases filed by unrepresented employees decreased by 3 and the number of cases filed by represented employees decreased by 4. Seven fewer cases were filed by employees in 2019 than in 2018.

Employers

Represented employers filed 7 of the 22 new cases in 2019. In 5 of those cases, the employee was represented and in 2 cases the employee was not represented. No cases were filed by an unrepresented employer.

Figure 11 compares unrepresented and represented employers. When compared to 2018, the number of cases filed by represented employers increased by 3 and the number of cases filed by unrepresented employers remained at zero.

COMMISSION DECISIONS

Published Decisions

In 2019, 19 Commission decisions were published: 17 final decisions on the merits of appeals, 1 memorandum decision on a petition for review, and 1 decision on reconsideration of a final decision. Appendix B is the list of the Commission's 2019 published decisions, with notes on the number of days from filing to issuance of a final decision on the merits of the appeal, the number of days from oral argument or record closure to issuance of a final decision, and whether the Commission's decision was appealed or petitioned for review to the Alaska Supreme Court.

In the 17 cases where a final decision on the merits of the appeal was issued in 2019, the average time from oral argument or record closure to the issuance of the final decision was 89 days, 1 day less than the statutory allowance of 90 days.

<u>Time Period between Initial</u> <u>Receipt and Decision on the</u> <u>Merits of an Appeal</u>

The Commission's target is to process cases within 360 days from initial receipt. Figure 12 below shows a timeline of approximately 255 days for an appeal if there is no cross-appeal, stay of appeal proceedings, or extensions of time. Appeal proceedings may be stayed or an extension of time may be granted for the parties to negotiate settlement.

As shown in Appendix B, the average time period between the initial receipt of an appeal and the issuance of a final decision on the merits of the appeal for cases on the 2019 docket was 329 days, 31 days less than the Commission's target of 360 days.

Published Decisions – Case Resolutions

The results of Commission decisions published in 2019 are summarized in Appendix B. Of the 17 published final decisions issued on the merits of appeals, 9 affirmed the Board's decision; 1 affirmed the Board's decision in part and remanded; 2 affirmed the Board's decision in part and reversed in part; 1 remanded to the Board; 2 reversed and remanded the Board's decision; and 2 affirmed in part, reversed in part, and remanded the Board's decision.

The Commission published 1 decision on reconsideration which modified a prior decision and remanded to the Board.

The Commission also published 1 memorandum decision on a petition for review in 2019, which affirmed in part, reversed in part, and remanded to the Board. The Commission does not consider the granting or denial of a petition for review to be a decision on the merits of the challenged Board decision.

ALASKA SUPREME COURT ACTION

Ten Commission decisions issued in 2019 were appealed to the Alaska Supreme Court; all are currently pending. *See* Appendix A.

In addition, 1 Commission order issued in 2019 was appealed to the Alaska Supreme Court and is currently pending. *See* Appendix A.

Three Commission orders issued in 2019 were petitioned for review to the Alaska Supreme Court: 2 were denied and 1 is currently pending. *See* Appendix A.

A total of 17 Commission decisions or orders presently await Alaska Supreme Court rulings: 4 issued in 2018, 12 issued in 2019, and 1 issued in early 2020. *See* Appendix A.

In 2019, the Alaska Supreme Court decided 6 appeals (2 of which were consolidated at the Court) and 3 petitions for review of Commission decisions and orders.

Of the 8 decisions, the Alaska Supreme Court issued 2 memorandum opinions and judgments which do not create legal precedent:

Memorandum Opinion and Judgment No. 1712, February 13, 2019, in a 2017 case, *McKee v. Alaska Functional Fitness, LLC*, which affirmed the Commission's decision which affirmed the Board's decision.

Memorandum Opinion and Judgment No. 1748, November 20, 2019, in a 2018 case, *Parsons v. Craig City School District*, which affirmed the Commission's decision which affirmed the Board's decision.

In 2019, the Alaska Supreme Court issued 6 opinions on appeals and petitions for review of Commission decisions and orders, which created legal precedent:

Opinion No. 7333, February 8, 2019, in a 2016 case, *Unisea, Inc. v. Morales de Lopez*, 435 P.3d 961, which affirmed the Commission's decision which reversed the Board's decision.

Opinion No. 7353, April 19, 2019, in a 2017 case, *Morrison v. Alaska Interstate Construction, Inc. and SKW Eskimos, Inc.*, 440 P.3d 224, which reversed the

Commission's decision and ordered the Board's award be reinstated.

Opinion No. 7356, April 26, 2019, in a 2016 case, *Warnke-Green v. Pro West Contractors, LLC*, 440 P.3d 283, which reversed and remanded the Commission's order on attorney fees.

Opinion No. 7383, July 5, 2019, in a 2017 case, *D&D Services d/b/a Novus Auto Glass v. Cavitt,* 444 P.3d 165, which affirmed the Commission's order on attorney fees.

Opinion No. 7402, August 30, 2019, in a 2017 case, *Tobar v. Remington Holdings LP*, 447 P.3d 747, which vacated the Commission's decision and remanded to the Commission with instructions to remand to the Board for further proceedings.

Opinion No. 7422, December 6, 2019, in 2 consolidated 2017 cases, *Rusch v. Southeast Alaska Regional Health Consortium* and *Dockter v. Southeast Alaska Regional Health Consortium*, 453 P.3d 784, which affirmed the Commission's decisions in part, reversed the Commission's decisions in part, reversed the Commission's decisions in part, and remanded to the Commission with instructions to remand to the Board for further proceedings.

REGULATION CHANGES

In September 2019, the Commission Chair and Clerk attended training regarding updating the Commission's regulations. A rough draft of proposed changes was begun; however, this project has been put on hold until after the 2020 legislative session as there is a bill pending, that if passed, would repeal the Commission.
