


Unemployment rate at 8.0 percent in February

Alaska's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate rose two-tenths of a percentage point in February to 8.0 percent, according to the Alaska Department of Labor and Workforce Development. January's rate was revised down one-tenth of a percentage point to 7.8 percent.

Claims for unemployment insurance – one of the major inputs used to calculate unemployment – were up 12 percent over the year in February. The other input is a survey of households that helps estimate the number of people who are unemployed but not claiming unemployment insurance benefits, either because they aren't eligible or for some other reason.

Payroll jobs increased by 4,000 in February (not seasonally adjusted), but over-the-year growth slowed to 0.8 percent after averaging 1.4 percent in 2008.

At the industry level, oil and gas jobs were up 700 over the year. Nearly all of that growth came during the early part of 2008, however. The industry's estimated 13,000 February jobs are still near historical highs, but the number has fallen by 300 since September.

Health care jobs were also up 700 over the year and government jobs were up 800. Although federal government jobs were down 100, state government jobs rose by 400 and local government by 500.

Industries with over-the-year losses included construction (-300), seafood processing (-100), food services and drinking places (-300) and accommodations (-100).

According to Dan Robinson, an economist with the Department of Labor, the job numbers indicate that the national recession and global economic slowdown are starting to have a more noticeable effect on the state.

"The unemployment rate has been rising for months, but the payroll job numbers are now beginning to show weakness," Robinson said. "The oil and gas industry has seen its job counts level off after several years of strong growth. Without that growth, Alaska will have a hard time avoiding the job losses afflicting most of the rest of the country."
