

Sources for graph and tables: Alaska Department of Labor and Workforce Development, Research and Analysis Section; and U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics Alaska's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate rose three-tenths of a percentage point in December to 7.5 percent, according to the Alaska Department of Labor and Workforce Development.

Over the last three months the rate has climbed eighttenths of a percentage point and is at its highest level since March 2004.

The estimated number of unemployed people in Alaska increased by more than 5,000 from December 2007 to December 2008, although there hasn't been a corresponding loss of jobs. In fact, payroll employment was up an estimated 3,200 over-the-year in December.

Unemployment rates can climb without job losses if a rising number of unemployed people from other states migrate to Alaska or if a decreasing number of unemployed Alaskans migrate out of the state. Both are more likely when the state's economy is relatively healthy compared to the nation's.

The rates can also be pushed higher if an increasing number of people enter the labor force and seek employment. For example, if formerly retired people or stay-at-home parents begin looking for work, they go from being considered outside the labor force to being considered unemployed.

To a small degree, that appears to have happened in 2008. The labor force participation rate – the percentage of the working-age population either employed or actively seeking employment – climbed from 70.3 percent in January to 71.1 percent in December.

The national picture is clearer: unemployment rose by more than 3.5 million from December 2007 to December 2008 and payroll jobs fell by nearly 2.6 million over the same period.

The country is in a deep recession that hasn't yet caused significant job losses in Alaska, according to Dan Robinson, an economist with the Alaska Department of Labor.

"Alaska is one of the few states whose economy continued to grow in 2008. But rising unemployment rates in Alaska are almost certainly the result of the struggling national economy."
