

Alaska's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was unchanged in July, holding at 8.3 percent. June's preliminary rate was revised down one-tenth of a percentage point to 8.3 percent.

The rate appears to have stabilized in recent months after climbing from a cyclical low point of 6 percent in early 2007 to its current level. Alaska's unemployment rate remains well below the national rate, which fell one-tenth of a percentage point in July to 9.4 percent. Before this year, the last time Alaska's unemployment rate was lower than the nation's was in 1983.

Alaska added an estimated 5,100 payroll jobs in July, a typical seasonal increase led by seafood processing and tourism-related industries. The job numbers remained below 2008 levels for the third consecutive month, however.

Several industries contributed to the over-the-year decline of 1,300 jobs. The biggest losses came from construction (-1,300), retail trade (-900), accommodations (-500), and food services and drinking places (-400). Partially offsetting those losses were gains of 1,000 health care jobs and 800 government jobs.

Taken together, the unemployment rate and job numbers continue to show that the national recession is hurting Alaska's economy, but to a lesser degree than in most states.

The primary reasons are because Alaska has few of the types of manufacturing jobs that have been disappearing in other parts of the country and also because the state's critical oil industry has been remarkably resilient. Since reaching an all-time high of 13,300 jobs in September 2008, the industry's job count has fallen by just 100 over the last 10 months despite volatile oil prices and recession-induced fluctuations in demand.

Many individuals in rural Alaska do not meet the definition because they have not conducted an active job search due to the scarcity of employment opportunities.
